I hold a J.S.D. (Ph.D.) in International Law from Columbia Law School (2021, highest distinction), focusing on human rights and social justice, an LL.M. from Columbia (2008) emphasizing international humanitarian law, and a law degree from the University of Jordan (2004). I serve as Assistant Professor at American University of Beirut and Director of the Palestine Land Studies Center, where I lead research on housing, land, and property rights. My academic positions include fellowships at Harvard Law School's Institute for Global Law and Policy and Columbia's Center for Gender and Sexuality Law, where I conducted extensive research on housing rights and forced displacement. I have taught courses on international law, human rights, and property law at Harvard, Columbia, Birzeit University, and Al-Quds University. I communicate effectively in Arabic (native), English (fluent), and French (B2), demonstrated through delivering training programs on housing rights across the MENA region, drafting policy briefs for UN agencies, and publishing in leading law journals. My written work includes the UN Women report "Gender Justice & The Law," examining women's housing rights, and scholarly articles on spatial justice and territorial rights in occupied territories.

My knowledge of international human rights instruments derives from twenty years of practical application and academic study. At the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) in Geneva (2015-2016), I developed rights-based frameworks for humanitarian aid delivery in besieged areas of Syria, directly addressing how sanctions and coercive measures impede access to essential services. This required extensive analysis of the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR), International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), and humanitarian law provisions regarding economic blockades. As an International Legal Expert for the United Nations International, Impartial, and Independent Mechanism (IIIM) for Syria (2019-2020), I designed victim-centered approaches to accountability, documenting how unilateral sanctions exacerbated civilian suffering during the

conflict. My work analyzed the intersection of international humanitarian law and human rights law concerning economic warfare and siege tactics. Currently serving as Senior Advisor to the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food, I provide analysis on how coercive economic measures violate the right to food, examining the impact of sanctions on food systems and food sovereignty.

3. ESTABLISHED COMPETENCE (200-word limit)

My expertise in addressing unilateral coercive measures is recognized through high-level UN appointments and academic leadership. At the OHCHR, I earned recognition for developing legal frameworks that address humanitarian exemptions and the impact of sanctions on vulnerable populations. My policy guidance on navigating economic blockades became standard reference material for UN field offices. The UN IIIM specifically recruited me to ensure accountability frameworks captured economic deprivation as a weapon of war. My United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) consultancies in Laos and Palestine (2022-2023) involved reviewing national legislation against international standards, including economic rights protections affected by coercive measures. My scholarship on the corporeal impact of law during the Arab Spring (Columbia Journal of Race and Law) examined how economic coercion affects human dignity. Through Harvard's Institute for Global Law and Policy, I engage with leading international lawyers on Third World Approaches to International Law, positioning coercive measures within global economic governance structures. As the Director of the Palestine Land Studies Center, I lead regional initiatives that document how economic sanctions compound territorial dispossession, bridging academic rigor with practical impact.

If the candidate has authored more than three relevant publications, please provide a brief summary of the rest (200-word limit): Beyond the three primary publications listed, my extensive body of work demonstrates sustained engagement with how coercive economic measures impact human rights. My publication "Palestinian Women and Security: A Legal Analysis" (2012, DCAF) examines how movement restrictions and economic blockades particularly affect women's access to resources and services. Through "Public Interest Law in the MENA Region: Cause Lawyering in Egypt and Palestine" (2016, PILnet), I documented strategic litigation approaches to challenge economic restrictions that violate fundamental rights. My policy contributions include developing victim-centered approaches to accountability for the UN International, Impartial and Independent Mechanism for Syria, ensuring that evidence collection captured the humanitarian consequences of siege warfare and economic deprivation. I co-drafted frameworks for the European Union on institutional responses to access restrictions in occupied territories. Additional reports for UN Women Palestine, UNDP Laos, and OHCHR Geneva examined how sanctions regimes intersect with existing vulnerabilities, particularly affecting marginalized communities' access to food, healthcare, and essential services. My ongoing research as Senior Advisor to the UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food directly addresses how unilateral coercive measures undermine food systems and food sovereignty.

During my work as a senior legal expert with UN Women, I worked with civil society actors and stakeholders in the MENA region on Women, Peace and Security Agenda. Lead key dialogues for Syrian women in leadership, and facilitated difficult conversation between Palestinian factions in pursuit of ending divide and reconciliation.

III. MOTIVATION LETTER, INCLUDING YOUR VISION FOR THE MANDATE

I seek appointment as Special Rapporteur on the negative impact of unilateral coercive measures on the enjoyment of human rights. My professional life has dedicated to understanding how law serves to ensure people survive and live their daily life with dignity. I have worked on access to essentials in besieged settings, on housing and land rights under strain, and on victim-centered accountability. I want to bring that practice-grounded perspective to a mandate that addresses measures which determine whether people can obtain food, medicine, power, and income.

My vision is simple and practical. The mandate should reduce preventable harm. It should document the full pathway of harm from design to enforcement to over-compliance. It should translate the law into clear guidance that states, banks, companies, and humanitarian actors can use the next day. And it should place those most affected at the center, with particular attention to women, children, older persons, persons with disabilities, and minorities.

My work will focus on four key priorities.

First, humanitarian access. I will map how exemptions and licenses function along supply chains for medicines, medical devices, food, water systems, power, and shelter materials. I will identify the bottlenecks, including banking de-risking and shipping or insurance refusals, and issue practical recommendations to unlock them.

Second, focus on the financial sector. I will convene regular dialogues with banks, payment processors, and insurers, as well as humanitarian agencies and regulators. The goal is to agree on workable due diligence and comfort language that protects both compliance needs and human rights. I will prepare a model checklist for financial institutions and a companion note for humanitarian actors that speeds lawful transfers.

Third, clarity on standards. I will restate how core treaties, the Charter, and relevant jurisprudence apply to unilateral measures, with a focus on necessity, proportionality, non-discrimination, and the duty to ensure access to essential goods and services. I will present indicators that allow monitoring of real-world impact, disaggregated by gender, age, disability, and location. I will also examine digital restrictions that impede access to communications, platforms, or software essential for health, education, and livelihoods.

Fourth, engagement and remedy. I will maintain open channels with both sanctioning and targeted states, and I will invite companies to provide information and commit to corrective steps. I will set up a confidential portal for communities and front-line workers to report specific blockages and will track the follow-up publicly in my reports.

Deliverables for the first year will include three outputs. One thematic report will map the life cycle of exemptions and identify points where harm can be prevented. A practice note will present indicators, checklists, and model clauses that states, banks, and aid groups can adopt immediately. A set of country and stakeholder visits will cover at least one sanctioning state and one affected context to ensure balanced engagement. Throughout, I will coordinate with the mandates on food, health, adequate housing, extreme poverty, and the right to development, and will invite joint work where mandates intersect.

I will approach this role with independence, transparency, and a commitment to listen. People living under restrictive measures deserve a mandate that can translate their testimonies into precise recommendations that change policy and practice. I have spent many years doing exactly that in other settings. As Special Rapporteur, I will work to ensure that every
