I obtained my PhD in Political Science from the European University Institute in Florence (Italy), thanks to a scholarship from the Spanish Ministry of Education. I also hold a Masters in Research from the Peace Studies Department at Bradford University (United Kingdom). Given that my doctoral thesis dealt with the imposition of sanctions in response to human rights violations, I got acquainted with the international norms they purport to uphold, as well as with their humanitarian consequences and other adverse effects. Acquiring familiarity with the human rights policies of various multilateral actors was integral part of my academic training. Several of my publications discuss the human rights implications of sanctions imposition. I am the author of a monograph analysing international sanctions, 'European Union Sanctions and Foreign Policy', published in the UK in 2010 and recipient of the international THESEUS Award. I am fluent in English. Most of my professional activity has unfolded in English: My entire graduate teaching experience is in English and the majority of my publications are written in English. I am also confident in French. Spanish is my mother tongue. Thanks to my extensive teaching experience and policy engagement, I am used to public speaking.

I was the inaugural recipient of the 'Human Rights Fellowship' awarded by the Human Rights Consortium at the School of Advanced Study, University of London (United Kingdom) in 2010. I have held fellowships with Monash University in Melbourne and Australian National University in Canberra to conduct research on human rights policies. As an International Relations scholar, I follow closely the work of the United Nations in the area of human rights. International human rights policies are integral part of the courses I teach at University. As a student, I interned with the Delegation of the EU to the United Nations. Overall, I have twenty years of research experience, including seventeen years of post-doctoral experience at professorial level.

My exposure to the field of human rights is primarily of scholarly nature. My competence in the field of sanctions and human rights is demonstrated by the fact that my doctoral dissertation received the THESEUS Award in 2011. I was the inaugural recipient of the Fellowship by the Human Rights Consortium of the University of London in 2010, which allowed me to start my research on sanctions and human rights. I was appointed an advisor on sanctions violations at the European Economic and Social Committee in 2023, and have delivered guest lectures at the German Institute for Human Rights in 2014 and various universities. I was invited to participate in the UN High Level Panel on Targeted Sanctions, and in consultative processes convened by the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the European Commission. I prepared several studies commissioned by the European Parliament, including 'Political Dialogue and Human Rights in the Cotonou Agreement' (2007). I teach a training course on international human rights instrument for the Helsinki Committee in Spain. My participation in the Geneva-based Targeted Sanctions Consortium further testifies to my competence.

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III. MOTIVATION LETTER, INCLUDING YOUR VISION FOR THE MANDATE

I wish to apply for the position as a Special Rapporteur on the negative impact of unilateral measures on the enjoyment of human rights.

My interest in this position emanates from my expertise in sanctions and human rights policies and the role they play in international relations, as well as from my knowledge of UN structures and processes. My research focuses on the use of non-military instruments in international relations. Ever since I started working on this issue, I was intrigued by the contradiction inherent in the use of sanctions to respond to human rights violations by applying measures that might be harmful to them. Thus, I have closely followed the development of the novel instrument of 'targeted' sanctions, designed to channel harm to those directly responsible for objectionable policies while minimising damage on the population at large. I am interested in investigating the effects of targeted sanctions. This entails interrogating the extent of disruption they produce, whether they harm the actors they are aimed at, and how they affect non-targeted groups. I am particularly interested in their human rights impact, an issue that has seldom been investigated in a systematic manner. I started work on this subject in 2010, when I was awarded a fellowship with the Human Rights Consortium at the University of London (United Kingdom).

The position as a Special Rapporteur would allow me to put my expertise in sanctions assessment at the service of the international community. My ambition is to provide a nuanced, comprehensive evaluation of the human rights impact of sanctions that can inform the debate on the usefulness and adequacy of these foreign policy tools. Having followed the current controversy on unilateral coercive measures in various UN fora, I am persuaded that only a scientifically sound analysis of the impact of sanctions that takes into account the diverse character of these tools can bring the debate forward.

As a Peace researcher and a social scientist, I am fully equipped to perform this task. Firstly, the mandate of the Special Rapporteur is indistinguishable from my personal research agenda. Over the decades in which I have conducted research on international sanctions, much of my academic production has centered on assessing their impact, which is in tune with the mandate of the Special Rapporteur. Thanks to my training in social science research methods, I am qualified to design and conduct a scientifically solid assessment exercise. Lastly, as an International Relations scholar, I have a good understanding of the United Nations system and an excellent knowledge of human rights protection and international policies employed in their promotion.

As a scholar, I enjoy the independence and the flexibility necessary to conduct unbiased research in a professional manner. On account of my experience in Asia, I acquired an understanding of the controversies associated with human rights outside the West and of the need to approach this issue in a culturally-sensitive manner. Being a Special Rapporteur with the Human Rights Council would allow me to promote awareness of human rights questions with the sanctions policy community.
